THE CHALLENGE OF MANAGING SITES IN A CHANGING ENVIRONMENT

Introduction

Eurosite's Annual Conference places site managers, their practical experience and the work of their nature conservation organisations centre stage. Site managers are facing tremendous challenges in their daily work: their working environment is changing, both in terms of their operating context and the physical nature of their sites. Climate change poses real threats and biodiversity is under tremendous pressure. Never have the challenges of managing sites in a changing environment been so great: never has the need for effective site management and expert site managers been greater.

Combining expert presentations, interactive sessions and site visits, the Eurosite Conference provides a unique opportunity to compare practices, gather information and learn about approaches and techniques being applied by colleagues on nature conservation sites around Europe. We invite you to join us to share your ideas, exchange views and network for Europe's nature.

Conference Overview

The 2010 Eurosite Conference is a three-day event. Our venue lies in the picturesque village of Dunblane, easily accessible by train, bus and car from Glasgow, Edinburgh, south and north of Scotland. Delegates arriving by train in Dunblane will be picked up by a courtesy shuttle bus. Apart from the field trips and one evening reception, all events will take place in the Dunblane Hydro Hotel, which boasts a spectacular setting - <http://doubletree.hilton.co.uk/dunblane?WT.srch=1>

The Conference is open to members and non-members alike: day delegates are also more than welcome. All site visits will depart from and return to the hotel. A generously subsidised 'all-inclusive' fee has been negotiated – apart from their own personal expenses and travel to and from the venue, delegates will be extended the best of Scottish hospitality.

In summary, the programme is as follows:

- Monday 13th September - arrival of delegates to the Conference venue: Dunblane Hydro Hotel, Dunblane;
- **Day 1: Tuesday 14th September** – main seminar day: The Challenge of Managing Sites in a Changing Environment;
- **Day 2: Wednesday 15th September** – network business and a choice of 4 field trips;
- **Day 3: Thursday 16th September** – further on-site learning with a choice of longer field trips, with variable timings to accommodate delegates' departure schedules.

The Conference closes with the return to the hotel from the field trips on Thursday, 16 September. However, should delegates wish to extend their stay for a day or two at their own cost, they will benefit from the negotiated conference rate.

Day 2: Wednesday 15th September

Evening Programme - 19.00 onwards

Following return to the hotel, the traditional “Eurococktail” will be followed by a meal and a ceilidh, for an evening of Scottish dancing and music – kilts are optional, but highly desirable, especially when bagpipes are around! For the Eurococktail, delegates are warmly invited to bring along a small sample of local produce (something to eat or drink, which typifies your part of Europe) to share with Conference participants.

Day 3: Thursday 16th September

The final day of the Conference provides various longer field trip options to exchange and compare practical site management experiences. The trips will be divided in to morning and afternoon sessions to enable delegates to depart at lunchtime if that would suit their travel plans. The trips will include options to feed red kites at Argaty, visit Flanders Moss, a boat trip on Loch Katrine, and visit the Great Trossachs Forest. At the end of the day, delegates will be brought back to the hotel. Although the Conference is officially ended, delegates may wish to stay on for an extra night or so and enjoy the local setting.
